# Open PTA Positions

It's Time Again to think about serving on Patwin's PTA Board. All Positions are open, including, President, 1st Vice President, 2nd Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary and Parliamentarian. Here is a brief description of each position:

## President

The President presides at all meetings of the association and executive board. Creates an environment of mutual respect in which everyone feels free to participate fully in discussing issues and making decisions. Remains impartial as the presiding officer. Delegates responsibility and gives those so delegated the opportunity to do the job, offering help only when needed. Respects others opinion and strives to improve leadership skills. Becomes familiar with basic financial procedures. Helps sets and implement PTA sponsored events through out the school year.

## 1st Vice President

Attends the (Parent/Teacher Leadership Group) PLG Meetings Monthly and reports back to the PTA at their monthly meeting. Helps the PTA President with PTA sponsored school functions.

## 2nd Vice President

Attends the Site Council meetings and reports back to the PTA at their monthly meeting. Helps the PTA President with PTA sponsored school functions.

## Treasurer

The treasurer is the authorized custodian of all funds of the association. Some responsibilities of the office are specified in the unit's bylaws and other are established by the district and state PTA procedures. Keep permanent records that track gross income, receipts and disbursements of the association, including the number of members, dues collected and the total per capita dues remitted through channels to the California state PTA.

## Secretary

Keep an accurate record (the minutes) of the proceedings of all meetings of the association and of the executive board. Read minutes of any previous meetings when called upon to do so. The minutes are the legal record of the PTA. Prepare and read a report of each executive board meeting at the association meeting. Request all motions to be put in writing.

## Parliamentarian

Acts as the time keeper at PTA Board meetings and updates bylaws (once)

## Carousel Representative Needed for Next Year

The carousel rep's job is very easy and requires only a little time and effort. A couple of weeks before school starts in the summer, we hang up an envelope in the office and put a carousel date request sign-up sheet in each teacher's mailbox. We come back in a couple of weeks and collect the envelope with the completed requests. The requests are delivered to Susan de Terra, who runs the program, and she conducts a random drawing to assign the carousel dates for the year for the whole district. A few days later, we distribute information packets to the teachers who receive dates (and letters, if necessary, to teachers who requested dates

and didn't receive them. Those teachers get put on a waiting list, and hopefully get dates later in the year).

After that, the only thing we do is give each teacher a quick reminder 2 or 3 weeks before their assigned date (which can be done by email or phone).

Occasionally, Susan asks the carousel volunteers (throughout the district) for someone to open the carousel for a private rental (like a birthday party), but this is not frequent, and it is voluntary.

It really is an easy (and fun) volunteer position that requires

very little time. We both work full time and have no problem fitting this into our schedule. Carousel volunteers do not actually work at the carousel at any time, so it really is quite simple.

The current representative would be happy to get together with the new volunteer and explain what we do or answer any questions.

## Dialogue with Dr. Deborah

**Dear Deborah,**  
**What is huffing? I keep hearing it thrown around. Should I be worried?**

**Concerned Dad**

Dear Concerned Dad:

Yes, you should be very worried about huffing, sniffing, snorting, inhaling, all synonymous terms for breathing in inhalants. Below is an informational piece taken verbatim from "Parents—the Anti-Drug" website and it applies to all youth, elementary and secondary age.

### Inhalants

Inhalants are common products found right in the home and are among the most popular and deadly substances kids abuse. Inhalant abuse can result in death from the very first use. According to the annual Monitoring the Future national poll, approximately one in six children will use inhalants by eighth grade. The same report notes that inhalants are most popular with younger teens. Teens use inhalants by sniffing or "snorting" fumes from containers; spraying aerosols directly into the mouth or nose; bagging, by inhaling a substance inside a paper or plastic bag; huffing from an inhalant-soaked rag; or inhaling from balloons filled with nitrous oxide.

Inhalants are breathable chemical vapors that produce psychoactive (mind-altering) effects. Although people are exposed to volatile solvents and other inhalants in the home and in the workplace,

many do not think of "inhalable" substances as drugs because most of them were never meant to be used in that way.

Young people are likely to abuse inhalants, in part, because inhalants are readily available and inexpensive. Parents should see that these substances are monitored closely so that children do not abuse them.

Inhalants fall into the following categories:

- **Solvents:** including industrial or household solvents or solvent-containing products, including paint thinners or solvents, degreasers (dry-cleaning fluids), gasoline, and glues; art or office supply solvents, including correction fluids, felt-tip-marker fluid, and electronic contact cleaners.
- **Gases:** gases used in household or commercial products; including butane lighters and propane tanks; whipping cream aerosols or dispensers (whippets), and refrigerant gases; household aerosol propellants and associated solvents in items such as spray paints, hair or deodorant sprays, and fabric protector sprays; medical anesthetic gases, such as ether, chloroform, halothane, and nitrous oxide (laughing gas).

- **Nitrites:** aliphatic nitrites, including cyclohexyl nitrite, which is available to the general public; amyl nitrite, which is available only by prescription; and butyl nitrite, which is now an illegal substance.

### Health Hazards

**Health Effects and Risks.** Nearly all abused inhalants produce effects similar to anesthetics, which act to slow down the body's functions. When inhaled in sufficient concentrations, inhalants can cause intoxicating effects that can last only a few minutes or several hours if inhalants are taken repeatedly. Initially, users may feel slightly stimulated; with successive inhalations, they may feel less inhibited and less in control; finally, a user can lose consciousness.

**Signs of Depression.** Research shows that inhalant use is also associated with symptoms of depression. Between 2004 and 2006, an estimated 218,000 youths aged 12-17 used inhalants and also experienced depression in the past year. The same research showed that depressed teens were more than three times as likely to start using inhalants than teens with no symptoms of depression. The reverse is also true, showing that teens often started using inhalants before depression began.<sup>1</sup>

**Irreversible hazards.** Inhalants are toxic. Chronic exposure can lead to brain damage or nerve

sclerosis; damage to the heart, lungs, liver and kidneys; and prolonged abuse can affect thinking, movement, vision and hearing.

Sniffing highly concentrated amounts of the chemicals in solvents or aerosol sprays can directly induce heart failure and death. Heart failure results from the chemicals interfering with the heart's rhythm regulating system, causing the heart to stop beating. This is especially common from the abuse of fluorocarbons and butane-type gases. High concentrations of inhalants also cause death from asphyxiation, suffocation, convulsions or seizures, coma, choking or fatal injury from accidents while intoxicated. Other irreversible effects caused by inhaling specific solvents are:

- Hearing loss - toluene (paint sprays, glues, dewaxers) and trichloroethylene (cleaning fluids, correction fluids)
- Peripheral neuropathies or limb spasms - hexane (glues, gasoline) and nitrous oxide (whipping cream, gas cylinders)
- Central nervous system or brain damage - toluene (paint sprays, glues, dewaxers)
- Bone marrow damage - benzene (gasoline)
- Liver and kidney damage - toluene-containing substances and chlorinated hydrocarbons (correction fluids, dry-cleaning fluids)
- Blood oxygen depletion - organic nitrites ("poppers," "bold," and "rush") and methylene chloride (varnish removers, paint thinners)

**Prevention.** Parents can keep youth away from inhalants by talking to them and letting them know the dangers of inhalants. Most young users don't realize how dangerous inhalants can be. Inhalants are widely available and inexpensive, and parents should be mindful about how and where they store common household products. Educate your kids and yourselves!

# Davis Farm to School Update

## A New Herb Garden:

Davis Farm to School Connection is pleased to announce that the DJUSD Central Kitchen now has its very own herb garden! Davis Farm to School Connection President Dorothy Peterson and her husband Allan planted a dozen herbs in front of the Central Kitchen building on 5th street. Most of the transplants provided were contributed from Davis High School teacher Amy Schulte's horticultural classes, and included Chives, Spearmint, Fennel, Sage, Thyme, Marjoram, and Lavender. The purpose of the herb garden is to provide fresh herbs on a daily basis for the Central Kitchen staff to use in their fresh-from-scratch cooking, which includes

salads, soups, pizzas, rice bowls, casseroles, chicken and turkey dishes as well as vegetarian.

Farm to School consultant, Georgeanne Brennan, has been working with the staff providing monthly culinary instruction that includes the use of fresh herbs. As the staff became knowledgeable about fresh herbs and their flavor profiles, they wanted to increase their use in the scratch cooking. It was decided that an on-site herb garden would begin to answer that need.

## Locally Grown Spring Vegetables on the Menu:

Each season the DJUSD Nutrition Services produces a seasonal

menu, indicating what vegetables and fruits will be available during the season. The spring menu runs from now through the end of school in June, so students will be tasting a wide range of locally grown vegetables from sugar snap peas, late cabbage, asparagus, young carrots, and kiwis to early cherry tomatoes, strawberries, and early zucchini toward the end of May and early June.

Georgeanne Brennan offered a Get Ready for Spring Vegetable class on March 12 to the Central Kitchen staff, that included new ways to use local and seasonal vegetables in the spring menu. Please enjoy a sample recipe from this cooking class below:

## Barley Salad with Spring Veggies and Chicken

### Ingredients:

½ c pearl barley  
2 c water  
½ tsp. salt  
1 c chopped mushrooms  
2 carrots, peeled and diced  
½ lb sugar snap peas, trimmed and sliced  
1 lb asparagus, trimmed and cut into 1 inch pieces  
½ c fresh parsley  
2/3 c toasted walnuts  
½ lb chicken, cooked and sliced

### Dressing:

¼ c fresh lemon juice  
¼ c extra virgin olive oil  
2 garlic cloves, minced  
1 tsp Dijon style mustard  
1 T chopped fresh dill  
1 T chopped fresh mint  
1 tsp salt  
½ tsp freshly ground pepper, to taste

Using a strainer, rinse the barley and drain. In a small, heavy skillet on low heat, roast the barley until fragrant and beginning to brown. Place the barley and water in a small saucepan, cover, and bring to a simmer. Cook on low heat until most of the water has been absorbed and the barley is soft, about 40 minutes. While the barley cooks, whisk together all of the dressing ingredients. In a separate bowl, pour half of the dressing over the mushrooms and set aside. Blanch the carrots in boiling water for 1 minute. Transfer with a slotted spoon to a large serving bowl. Blanch the asparagus for 1 to 2 minutes, rinse under cold water. Stir the sugar snap peas, parsley, and marinated mushrooms into the bowl of carrots. When the barley is tender, drain it into a colander. Add the drained barley and the remaining dressing to the serving bowl and mix well. Allow the salad to sit for at least 30 minutes before serving. Just before serving, gently toss the asparagus and walnuts into the salad. Top with cooked chicken. Serves 6

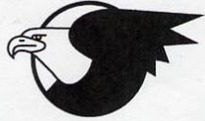

No casts, pregnant persons, or intoxicated individuals are allowed on rides. Some rides are height restricted so those under 36 inches may not want to purchase the unlimited pass.

Advance purchase tickets also available at the Davis Food Coop, H<sub>2</sub>O To Go, Fleet Feet and Lamppost Pizza. One-day tickets may also be purchased at the Carnival for \$25.00 each day. In addition, tickets for individual rides will be available for purchase on the premises.
